#### **Deschutes County Cannabis Advisory Panel**

Meeting #4: Monday, July 18, 2022, 6:00 p.m.
Deschutes Services Building, Barnes and Sawyer Rooms, 1300 NW Wall Street, Bend

#### I. Introductions / Call to Order

This meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Cannabis Advisory Panel Chair Liz Lotochinski. Present via Zoom: Patti Adair, Deschutes County Commissioner; Phil Chang, Deschutes County Commissioner; Tony DeBone, Deschutes County Commissioner; Will Grove, Deschutes County Planning Manager; Ashley DuPois, Representative Kropf's Office; Andrew Aasen; Kyle Gorman. Present in person: Erik Kropp, Deputy County Administrator; Mary Fleischmann; Gary Bracelin; Liz Lotochinski; Hunter Neubauer; Detective Dustin Miller and Deputy Kyle Pettit, Deschutes County Sheriff's Office. #### II. Approval of April 18, 2022 Minutes

Mary Fleischmann motioned to approve the minutes. Hunter Neubauer seconded the motion. Minutes approved unanimously.

## III. Update on Marijuana Revenue Programming for FY 22-23 Budget - Erik Kropp, Deputy County Administrator

Erik Kropp provided the panel an update on how the Budget Committee allocated marijuana revenue in the FY22-23 budget. The panel's recommendation to the Budget Committee had suggested allocating portions of the revenue to four categories: education, Deschutes County Health Services, Deschutes County Code Enforcement and the Deschutes County Sheriff's Office. The Budget Committee allocated the \$160,000 revenue consistent with panel's recommendation: \$20,000 to Code Enforcement; \$70,000 to DCSO to partially fund the detective assigned to marijuana detail; and \$70,000 to DCHS for prevention and education activities related to youth and marijuana. Commissioner Chang added that

within the panel's recommendation next year, the recommendation may want to clarify that the funds are meant to be additive and not a substitute for funding from another source.

### IV. Summary/Overview of Community Development Department's Marijuana Program – Tarik Rawlings, Associate Planner

Tarik Rawlings provided an overview of the Deschutes County marijuana program, the background and history of the program. He explained the site visit process and feedback received from those visits. Currently there are 13 pending land use applications awaiting approval.

#### V. Discussion on Cannabis Processing and Wholesale - Presenter: Hunter Neubauer, OreGrown

Hunter Neubauer provided an overview of cannabis processing and wholesale. He explained the industry has seen the effects of federal regulations not keeping up with the state, as well as the effects of illegal grows recently. There's a large supply/demand issue, with so many grows and processors but not enough places for it to go. However the market is positioned really well for when it is able to go national. Hunter expressed his excitement for the relationship with law enforcement and those who regulate the program, because then the process is done in the right way. Now the industry, OLCC, and legislation are communicating and that's exciting.




