Here's what you need to know about the May 21 primary election.

- **Oregon holds closed primaries**: Both major political parties Republican and Democrat have chosen to hold closed primary elections in Oregon. That means unless you're a registered member of a major political party, you won't see their candidates on your May ballot. You can check to see if you're registered with a political party at Oregonvotes.gov.
- Register to vote by April 30. Register online or check your registration information at <u>Oregonvotes.gov</u>. Ballots will be mailed out beginning on May 1. Election Day is May 21, 2024.
- Ballots must be received or mailed with a valid postmark by 8 p.m. Election Day. You may also choose to drop your ballot at one of dozens of official drop boxes. Visit <u>Oregonvotes.gov/Dropbox</u> to find the drop box nearest you.
- **Don't be fooled by false information**: False information is often emotionally charged, polarizing, and designed to spread easily online. Get the facts from official sources like Oregonvotes.gov or by calling your county elections office. You can find your county elections office at <u>Oregonvotes.gov/Counties</u>.

Voters' Pamphlet Translations Making Voting Accessible

ORS 251.026, 251.167, 251.170, 251.173 & 251.315

In 2021, the Oregon Legislature passed the Voter Language Access Bill (HB 3021) requiring the Secretary of State to translate portions of state and county voters' pamphlets into Oregon's most spoken languages. The law seeks to remove barriers to voting for those who are not fully proficient in English.

To help in this effort, the Translation Advisory Council was created. The Council is made up of volunteer community members who represent the ethnic, linguistic, and cultural diversity of Oregon voters. Council members make sure translations are accurate and retain the original tone and meaning in a culturally appropriate manner.

Selected portions of this state voters' pamphlets are available in Arabic, Simplified Chinese, French, German, Japanese, Korean, Marshallese, Russian, Spanish, Tagalog, Thai, Ukrainian, and Vietnamese.

Dates to Remember



→ Tuesday, April 30

Last day to register to vote or to change political party affiliation for this election.

> Wednesday, May 1

First day for counties to mail ballots.



→ Tuesday, May 21

Election Day Last day to return your ballot. If you mail your ballot it <u>must</u> have a USPS postmark by 8 pm on Election Day. Or return your ballot to an official drop box by 8 pm on Election Day.

Use this online tool to check or update your registration status and track your ballot.



- \rightarrow sign another person's ballot return envelope for them
- ightarrow vote more than once in an election or cast a fraudulent ballot
- ightarrow vote a ballot if you are not legally qualified to do so
- ightarrow coerce, pressure, or otherwise unduly influence another voter
- → sell, offer to sell, purchase, or offer to purchase another voter's ballot
- → obstruct an entrance of a building in which a voting booth or official ballot dropsite is located
- → deface, remove, alter, or destroy another voter's ballot, a posted election notice, or election equipment or supplies
- → attempt to collect voted ballots within 100 feet of an official ballot dropsite
- → establish a dropsite without displaying a sign stating "Not An Official Ballot Dropsite"

Any violations of the identified election laws are subject to civil and/or criminal penalties.

Know Your Rights **Drop Site Safety**

Your rights as an Oregon Voter include:

- → the right to access official ballot boxes and election offices without interference
- \rightarrow the right to **keep your vote private**
- \rightarrow the right to **vote without intimidation or threats**

Voter Intimidation may include:

- → Aggressive or harassing questions about whether you are qualified to vote intended to interfere with your right to vote, scare you into voting a certain way or to intimidate you from voting, such as questions about your citizenship status, criminal record, residency, other personal information, or questions about how you intend to vote.
- → False or misleading statements or accusations about voter fraud or related criminal penalties, designed to frighten you away from voting.
- → Verbal or physical threats express or implied meant to stop you from voting or to force you to vote for a particular candidate or measure.
- → **Purposefully obstructing or interfering** with your ability to vote.
- → Targeted surveillance of particular voters or groups of voters, such as following or tracking voters, copying license plates, taking videos or photos, etc., with the intent to dissuade or obstruct them from voting.

Where do I vote?

In Oregon, we vote by mail. You can vote anywhere you choose.

If you're registered to vote by **April 30**, your ballot will be mailed between **May 1** and **May 7**. Your county elections office will mail it to the address in your voter registration record.

If you don't receive your ballot by **May 10**, call your county elections office.

What if I've moved?

Ballots cannot be forwarded. To receive your ballot, update your voter registration information at **oregonvotes.gov/myvote**.

If Election Day is less than 5 days away, call your county elections office for instructions on how to get your ballot.

How can I get my ballot early?

If you will be away from your home on Election Day, update your voter registration information at <u>oregonvotes.gov/myvote</u>. To request an absentee ballot, enter your absentee mailing address and how long you will be there.

Is the voters' pamphlet translated into other languages?

Yes. Portions of the voters' pamphlet are available online in:

How do I complete my ballot?

Your ballot packet will include instructions on how to complete and return your ballot. Follow the instructions!

What if my dog eats my ballot?

If your ballot is lost, destroyed, or damaged in a way that stops you from voting, call your county elections office and ask for a replacement ballot.

Do I have to vote on everything?

No. Your ballot will still be counted, even if you don't vote for every contest or measure on it.

Can I change how I voted?

If you have mailed or dropped off your ballot, your vote cannot be changed. If you still have your ballot, follow the instructions that were sent with your ballot.

How do I return my ballot?

You can return your ballot by mail, no stamp needed. If you mail your ballot, it <u>must have</u> <u>a USPS postmark dated</u> on or before **8 pm** on **May 21**.

Or return your ballot to any county elections office or official drop box. You can find the nearest drop box, along with a map of how to get there, at **oregonvotes.gov/dropbox** or by contacting your county elections office.

County elections offices are open Election Day from 7 am to 8 pm.

Is the secrecy sleeve required?

If you received a secrecy sleeve, you don't have to use it unless you want to.

If you didn't receive a secrecy sleeve, your county is one of the many that have incorporated additional security features approved by the Secretary of State's Office into the ballot return envelope and therefore no longer need the sleeve.

Do I have to sign my ballot return envelope?

Yes. Your signature is a security measure used to verify your identity. You're the only person who can sign your ballot return envelope. Power of Attorney documents do not apply to voting.

If you cannot sign your name, contact your county elections office for more information.

Your ballot is only counted if the signature on the ballot return envelope matches signatures in your voter registration record.

If your signature does not match or you forget to sign the envelope, the county will notify you. You will have until 21 days after the election to prove you were the one who signed the envelope.

If my name is on the ballot return envelope, is my vote really secret?

Yes. After signature verification, your ballot is separated from the ballot return envelope before it is unfolded and reviewed.

Was my ballot counted?

As a registered voter, you may view updated ballot information at <u>oregonvotes.gov/</u> <u>myvote</u>. You can see when a ballot is sent, received, or if it was returned as undeliverable.

When will election results be known?

Initial results are released beginning at **8 pm**, **May 21** and will continue to be updated through election night and the days following.

Between election night and the date the election results are certified, the unofficial results reported on oregonvotes.gov will change. This change represents ballots that were postmarked by 8 pm on election night, being received and counted.

Final results, especially for close contests, may not be known until the election is certified and the official abstract of votes is published. Final certified results will be available 37 days after the election.

Do I need a provisional ballot?

If your eligibility to vote can't be determined you will be issued a provisional ballot.

To obtain a provisional ballot, go to your county elections office <u>in person</u> and fill out a Provisional Ballot Request Form.

Your provisional ballot will only be counted if you are determined to be eligible to vote.

How do I file a complaint?

If you believe Oregon election law has been broken, and are an Oregon registered voter, you can ask the Elections Division to investigate. Anonymous requests will not be investigated.

Voters with Disabilities

What are the different ways I can vote?

ightarrow Accessible format ballot

You mark this ballot using a computer with assistive technology, print and return it. You may also use the accessible tablets or computer stations located in every county elections office.

- \rightarrow Large print ballot
- ightarrow Ask for help

Who can help me vote my ballot?

ightarrow Anyone except your employer or union

You can get help from a friend, family member or other trusted person. Under Oregon law you cannot receive help from your employer or union.

ightarrow County Voting Assistance Team

You do not have to ask for help from someone you know. County Voting Assistance Teams are available to help you vote your ballot privately and independently.

What if I cannot sign my ballot return envelope?

ightarrow You may use a signature stamp or other indicator as your signature

You must complete a signature stamp attestation form along with a voter registration card before using the stamp or mark to sign your ballot envelope.

What other accessible resources are available?

ightarrow Statewide Voters' Pamphlet

Know Your Rights You have the right to Vole

If you are a US citizen, live in Oregon, are 18 years old, and have registered to vote.

- → You have the right to a secret vote. You do not have to tell anyone how you voted.
- → You have the right to get a "provisional ballot", even if you are told you are not registered to vote.
- → You have the right to get a new ballot if you make a mistake.
- → You have the right to vote for the person you want. You can write in someone else's name if you don't like the choices on your ballot.
- → You have the right to vote "yes" or "no" on any issue on your ballot.
- → You have the right to leave some choices blank on your ballot. The choices you do mark will still count.
- → You have the right to use a voting system for all Federal Elections that makes it equally possible for people with disabilities to vote privately and independently.
- → You have the right to know if your ballot, including a "provisional ballot," was accepted for counting.
- → You have the right to file a complaint if you think your voting rights have been denied.

- → You have the right to vote or cast your ballot if you are in line by 8 pm on Election Day.
- → You have the right to know if you are registered to vote.
- → You have the right to choose whether or not you want to register as a member of a political party.
- → You have the right to use a signature stamp or other mark but first you have to fill out a form. No one can sign for you.
- → You have the right to ask for help from elections staff or from a friend or family member. There are some people who cannot help you vote, for example, your employer or union.
- → You have the right to vote if you are houseless.
- → You have the right to vote if you have been convicted of a felony but have been released from custody, even if you are on probation or parole.
- → You have the right to vote if you have a guardian and if you need help reading or filling out your ballot.

Political Party Statements

At the Primary Election, a statewide political party that intends to nominate candidates for the general election may file a voters' pamphlet statement about the party's principles and its candidates. The party's statement may also oppose the principles and candidates of other political parties or organizations.

The following political parties did not submit a statement for the **2024 Primary Election**:

 \rightarrow No Labels Party of Oregon

Candidates

Oregon statute (ORS 254.155) requires the Secretary of State to complete a random order of the letters of the alphabet to determine the order in which the names of the candidates will appear on the ballot.

The alphabet for the 2024 Primary Election is:

E, U, X, Z, P, I, D, Q, B, O, F, A, C, T, L, G, W, R, N, Y, H, S, V, K, J, M

Candidate statements included in the pamphlet are separated by office type and position and are further arranged in the same random order in which the names of candidates will be printed on the ballot. In the primary election pamphlet, partisan candidates are further separated by political parties.

Statements are arranged in the following manner:

- → Republican candidates by position, in ballot order
- → Democratic candidates by position, in ballot order
- \rightarrow nonpartisan candidates by position, in ballot order

Candidates pay a fee or submit signatures in lieu of paying the fee for space in the voters' pamphlet. The information required by law pertaining to occupation, occupational background, educational background and prior governmental experience—has been certified as true by each candidate.

Duties and Responsibilities of Precinct Committeepersons

Precinct Committeepersons (PCPs) encourage voter registration, vote on official party business, elect county party leadership and nominate State Representatives or State Senators when there is a vacancy in one of those offices.

PCPs are only permitted for major political parties. The Democratic Party of Oregon and the Oregon Republican Party have both chosen to elect PCPs.

Each precinct is allotted a number of PCPs based on the count of registered voters in the precinct. Individuals can only file for (or serve in) one precinct at a time. However, PCP candidates can choose whether they want to file to serve in the precinct they live in or a related one.

Because the Honest Elections Oregon coalition had already gathered over 100,000 signatures on its initiative petition to reform campaign finance in Oregon, the Legislature finally acted.

People centered policies: We work on policies that bring us together, like reducing the high cost of living (especially for housing), homelessness, addiction, and the causes and effects of fire and extreme weather on our communities.

COMMUNITY BASED CANDIDATES

These special interests accounted for nearly all of the \$153 million spent on Oregon political campaigns in 2022 and most of the \$52 million spent in 2023 on lobbying in Oregon. Regular voters can't match those big dollars. But we can fight them with our voting power.

WE ARE HAVING AN IMPACT

We have worked on several policies to protect taxpayers, consumers, and our environment over the years, but our main focus has been to restore power to ordinary citizens. This year, our co-chair negotiated Oregon's first meaningful campaign finance legislation. The coalition also brought campaign finance reform to Portland in 2018 and Multnomah County in 2016.

Founded in 1971, based on the **principles of non-aggression**, **voluntary cooperation**, **and maximum personal liberty**, the **Libertarian Party** has become America's largest third-party.

However, we are not ignorant to the fact the electoral system is rigged to benefit the special interest, corporate, and big labor financed Democratic and Republican parties and that electoral success will be difficult, but certainly not impossible, until reforms are made to the electoral process, such as:

I. Proportional Representation of seats in the State House and Senate.

II. Ranked Choice Voting in all elections.

III. Allowing Voters to choose "None of the Above" for any office on the ballot.

Waging Peace by Rejecting Entangling Foreign Alliances

The Libertarian Party has long rejected unneeded foreign entanglements such as the NATO, the IMF, and the WHO that only push our nation and the world ever closer to nuclear war, poverty, and ill health. International relations should be based on situational politics and the self-interest of the United States, it is in that vein that **the LPO firmly opposes**:

- A. Providing further military support to Ukraine in its regional dispute with Russia, which has **fed inflation, fueled global** economic distress, and greatly increased the threat of nuclear war for the first time in generations.
- B. The United States government continuing as chief arms supplier for the world, which has facilitated and made our government complicit in countless humanitarian tragedies, such as the ongoing massacre of the civilian population of Gaza by Israeli Defense Forces, which many experts in international law consider to be a genocide.
- C. Providing economic or military subsidy to any foreign government.
- D. Efforts by the government to silence whistle blowers and journalists like Edward Snowden and Julian Assange, who should be considered heroes rather than enemies of the state.

Operation Warhawk Removal

Earlier this year, the LPO's Public Policy Board adopted a resolution supporting "Operation Warhawk Removal," a program to defeat incumbent members of Congress who support belligerent policies such as supplying Ukraine and Israel with arms and operational funding in their conflicts with Russia and Hamas, initiatives which have no direct impact on the lives of our citizens, but which, by way of our government's involvement, negatively effects our national security and economy as a whole. Of Oregon's congressional delegation, the worst of these offenders are:

Lori Chavez-DeRemer (Republican, Congressional District 5) Val Hoyle (Democrat, Congressional District 4) Andrea Salinas (Democrat, Congressional District 6)

These incumbents have continually shown their willingness to put the interests of their constituents second to that of foreign powers and the arms industry, proving their unworthiness to hold office. Real Campaign Finance Reform

Oregon candidate spending skyrocketed from \$4 million in 1996 to \$153 million in 2022, when the campaigns for Governor spent over \$80 million (double the record set in 2018). Candidates in one race for the Oregon Senate spent \$5 million, over \$80 per vote.

After 165 years of not limiting campaign contributions, the Oregon Legislature in March 2024 was forced to act, because the <u>Honest Elections Oregon</u> coalition had gathered over 100,000 signatures to put real campaign finance reform–Initiative Petition 9–on the November 2024 ballot.

The Oregon Progressive Party is a founding member of the <u>Honest Elections Oregon</u> coalition. The new contribution limits are not perfect; more work is needed.

Oregon Progressive Party members also wrote the campaign finance charter amendment adopted by Multnomah County voters in 2016 and copied into the City of Portland measure passed in 2018.

Invest in Oregon

Oregon's \$140 billion of state investment funds should be invested in public works and jobs for Oregonians, instead of corporations almost entirely outside of Oregon. The State pays over \$1 billion in fees every year (mostly undisclosed) to vulture capitalists, corporate raiders and leveraged buyout artists who invest Oregon funds in fossil fuels and makers of spyware used to oppress activists worldwide (search NSO, Pegasus, Oregon).

Oregon local governments borrow about \$4 billion per year, mostly for infrastructure improvements, and pay around \$200 million per year in fees to issue bonds and high bond interest rates.

Let's cut out the Wall Street middle men. Local governments should borrow the needed funds from an Oregon State Bank. The Bank of North Dakota funds local infrastructure improvements at interest of 2%. If an Oregon State Bank charged local governments 3% interest, they would save \$40 million per year in interest as well as avoid the \$200 million per year in fees.

Military Spending

The bloated U.S. military budget (\$886 billion in 2024) should be cut by \$250 billion. The U.S. has active duty U.S. troops in 178 countries and 750 foreign military bases.

Grassroots Democracy

Oregonians need to be able to effectively use the initiative process, including secure electronic signatures to allow wider participation. We support STAR Voting and Ranked Choice Voting to break the 2-party domination and the "spoiler effect."

Human Rights

We believe that all human beings are fundamentally worthy of respect and dignity. We support equal rights for all, including same-sex marriage. We support the rights of trans kids and adults to participate without discrimination in all aspects of life. We support Medicare for All comprehensive health care. We oppose cuts in Social Security & Medicare benefits.

Environmental Protection and Justice

We support an Oregon Green New Deal and taxing emissions that cause climate change and the diesel and other pollution that harm human health. We oppose offshore oil & gas drilling and importing/exporting fossil fuels from Oregon ports. Genetically engineered food should be labeled as such. We oppose aerial spraying of pesticides/insecticides in the management of forests and the foreign export of logs from all forests in Oregon.

Fair Taxation

Oregon's income tax kicker should be converted to a <u>Workers' Kicker</u> that refunds the same to every taxpayer. We oppose government promotion of gambling, which is a hidden regressive tax. We support removing the mortgage interest deduction on vacation homes.

This is your May 21, 2024 Primary Election Voters' Pamphlet provided by your Deschutes County Clerk's Office. It contains information about candidates and measures from local jurisdictions within the boundaries of Deschutes County.

This pamphlet contains the ballot measures and explanatory statements designed to provide impartial information. It also contains paid arguments for or against certain measures. Candidates may also pay to place a statement in the pamphlet.

Ballots will be mailed on Wednesday, May 1, 2024, to each registered voter. Here are a few things you should know:

- Mail your voted ballot in your postage-paid return envelope or drop it off at an official drop site location by 8:00 pm, Tuesday, May 21, 2024. Ballots that are mailed, postmarked by the United States Postal Service (USPS) by 8 pm on Election Day and received by the Clerk's Office by Tuesday, May 28, 2024 will be accepted. Remember to sign your ballot return envelope.
- Drop sites open Friday, May 3. Check the *Official Ballot Drop Sites* page in the pamphlet for more details.
- Candidate names on your ballot will appear in random alphabetical order. In accordance with ORS 254.155, random ordering of the letters is conducted prior to an election.
- Not all the candidates or measures in this Voters' Pamphlet will be on your ballot. Your residence
 address determines those districts for which you may vote. Your official ballot will contain only
 those issues on which you are eligible to vote, based on where you live.
- Not all candidates submit information for the Voters' Pamphlet, so you may have candidates on your ballot that are not in the Voters' Pamphlet.
- This Voters' Pamphlet is online at <u>www.deschutescounty.gov/elections</u>. After 8:00 pm on Election Night, preliminary election results will be posted online at <u>www.deschutescounty.gov/ElectionResults</u>.
- If a ballot was delivered to your residence for someone who should no longer be receiving a ballot at your address, please write "RETURN" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox.
- The signature on each voter's ballot return envelope is verified against the voter's signature on file. The signatures must match before a ballot can be counted. If your signature has changed, please update your voter registration.







Primary Elections in Oregon

How They Work & What They Mean for Voters

What is a Primary Election?

Primary elections are partisan elections that *major* political parties use to nominate candidates to run for partisan office in general elections. *Minor* political parties nominate candidates to run for partisan office in the general election according to party rule, and those candidates do not appear on the primary election ballot. Winning candidates of a general election are elected into office. Partisan offices include U.S. President, U.S. Senator, U.S. Representative, Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General, State Senator, and State Representative.

At general elections, voters will receive a ballot containing both partisan and nonpartisan offices and can vote for any candidate even if they are not of the same party. Most statewide ballot measures are on the general election ballot.

How are Primaries Conducted in Oregon?

Closed vs Open Primaries

A *closed* primary requires a voter to be registered with a political party in order to vote for that party's candidate; the election for the partisan candidate is closed to nonaffiliated voters as well as minor party affiliated voters. An *open* primary is an election that does not require voters to be affiliated with a political party to vote for partisan candidates.

Primary Elections in Oregon

Oregon's primary is closed, meaning only registered voters of a major political party can vote for candidates of the same party. At the primary election, voters who are not registered in one of the major political parties will receive a ballot containing nonpartisan contests, such as judicial elections, which all registered voters may vote on. Major political parties (the Democratic and Republican parties) have the option of opening up their primary elections to allow voters not affiliated with any political party to vote in the party's primary. If the parties choose not to open up their primaries, only voters registered with the Democratic or Republican parties may vote for those parties' candidates for partisan offices.

Primary Elections in Deschutes County

Every office in Deschutes County is nonpartisan. The majority of county offices are elected in general elections unless there are three or more candidates by the filing deadline for the primary election. These candidates would then be on the primary ballot, with the top two vote-getters facing off in the general election.

The County Assessor, County Commissioners, and Justice of the Peace are elected differently than other county offices; they are elected in primary elections. If no candidate receives a majority of votes (50% + 1 vote) for the office, the two candidates who receive the highest number of votes in the Primary are nominated and move to the General Election.

Closed Primary System

For the May 21, 2024 Primary Election, the Democratic and Republican parties have chosen to close their primaries to voters not affiliated with their parties. 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Ballot Title **9-164**

Five Year Local Option Tax Renewal for District Dust Abatement

QUESTION: Shall District impose \$0.60 per \$1000 of assessed property value for dust abatement for 5 years beginning in 2025. This measure renews current local option taxes.

SUMMARY: Newberry Estates Special Road District "District" covers road repairs, snow removal, grading, weed control and fire break/vehicle safety corridor for all roads within the District from its general fund.

The District has a separate local option tax levy for annual Dust Abatement Application that will expire at the end of this year. To continue this service the District is proposing a levy of \$0.60 per \$1000, or \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed property value for a five year period beginning in 2025.

The current annual cost to apply dust abatement materials is approximately \$25,000. Our current levy generates approximately \$13,000 annually leaving a large gap that must be paid from the District's general fund.

This measure is estimated to generate approximately \$19,500 in 2024-2025, \$20,085 in 2025-2026, \$20,688 in 2026-2027, \$21,308 in 2027-2028 and \$21,947 in 2028-2029 for an estimated total of \$103,528 over five years. This will allow for continuation of the successful dust abatement program in the spring of each year.

Explanatory Statement

Ballot Title 9-165

Renewal of 5 year Operations Levy for the Fire District

QUESTION: Shall District renew 5-yr. local option levy of \$0.64/\$1,000 assessed value for operating purposes beginning 2024-2025?

This measure renews current local option taxes.

SUMMARY: This measure renews the current tax rate for La Pine Rural Fire Protection District for five years and provides continuing funds for operating costs that:

- Maintain 2 Advanced Life Support ambulances in service-24/7
- Maintain one Duty Officer in the District at all times to ensure effective emergency response.
- Maintain operations of all District fire stations- Huntington, Burgess/Day and South Century Drive.
- · Maintain volunteer and student programs to support operations.
- Maintain the 2012 ISO insurance rating lowering insurance costs.
- Allow continued grant matching funds for equipment, apparatus, facilities, programs, and personnel.
- Maintain 21 career Firefighter/Paramedics and provides for training.
- Provide funding to maintain EMS equipment for medical services and transportation.

The local option levy is for five years, renewing July 2024. The tax rate remains at \$0.64/\$1000 assessed valuation. Estimated revenues over 5 years:

2024-2025: \$1,421,088; 2025-2026: \$1,463,721; 2026-2027: \$1,507,633; 2027-2028: \$1,552,862; 2028-2029: \$1,599,448; Total estimated tax to be raised by measure: \$7,544,752.

Explanatory Statement

This measure maintains the current Fire District tax rate as well as the current levels of fire and emergency medical services. This local option operating levy has been in effect since 1998 and was last renewed in 2014 by the voters of the Fire District. In June 2024, the levy expires and the District is asking voters to renew the local option levy at the same rate, again for five years, starting in July 2024. The tax rate will remain the same at \$0.64/\$1000 of assessed valuation. A home valued at \$200,000 would continue to pay \$128.00 per year (\$10.66/month).

Renewal of this levy allows the District to maintain current personnel and continue providing for the emergency service needs of our constituents and future needs for our citizens.

- Emergency Alarms and demand for service have continually increased over the past 10 years.
- Emergency Medical Services account for 84% of alarm volume with ambulance transports to Bend lasting approximately 2 hours.
- Continuous threat of wildfire and explosive building growth challenge service delivery.

This levy, along with other taxes, fees, and levies will provide essential funding that:

- Maintain ambulance services that provide for our citizens and meet system demands.
- Maintain emergency medical service supplies and equipment that meet industry standards for treatment and transportation.
- Maintain operations of District Fire stations to maintain ISO ratings and provide reductions in insurance costs and property loss.

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- Maintain support of our volunteer, reserve and support services program.
- Provide continued grant matching funds for equipment, apparatus, facilities, programs, and personnel decreasing overall financial burden to tax payer.
- Maintain 21 career Firefighter/Paramedics.
- Maintain technology and software that supports emergency response services.

Renewal of 10 year Capital Levy for the Fire District

QUESTION: Shall District renew 10-yr. capital replacement levy of \$0.23/\$1,000 assessed value for capital projects beginning 2024-2025?

This measure renews current local option taxes.

SUMMARY: This measure renews La Pine Rural Fire Protection District's expiring bond levy with a tax rate of \$0.23/\$1000 assessed valuation to provide for capital funds for:

- Replacement schedule of ambulances.
- Replacement schedule of fire apparatus.
- · Replacement schedule of command and staff vehicles.
- Replacement schedule of breathing apparatus and air cylinders.
- Replacement schedule of personal protective equipment.
- Addition of standardized fire and Emergency Medical equipment.
- Addition, upgrade, and maintenance of technology and service contracts to ensure protection of health information.
- Facility maintenance and upgrades to support community response needs.

The capital local option levy is for ten years starting in July 2024. The tax rate remains at the current rate of the District's capital levy expiring June 2024. Estimated over 10 years is: 2024-2025: \$488,472; 2025-2026: \$503,126;

2026-2027: \$518,220;

2027-2028: \$533,766; 2028-2029: \$549,779; 2029-2030: \$566,273; 2030-2031: \$583,261; 2031-2032: \$600,759; 2032-2033: \$618,782; 2033-2034: \$637,345; The total estimated tax cost \$5,599,783.

Explanatory Statement

This measure keeps the current overall Fire District tax rates the same as well as sustains the current level of fire and emergency medical services. It renews the expiring 10-year capital option levy with a tax rate of \$0.23/\$1,000 of assessed valuation starting in July 2024. Every ten years since 1974 District voters have approved capital bonds or levies for the purpose of facility, apparatus and equipment acquisition and replacement. The advantage of a local option levy is that tax payers do not pay for the cost of issuing a new bond and there is no interest payment on the levy. By maintaining the funding of the capital optioning the capital replacement program to maintain service levels.

The District has \$8.1 million in capital assets and a long-range plan to replace facilities, apparatus, ambulances, equipment and technology in a responsible and efficient manner consistent with Industry and workplace best practices. If renewed, the tax rate would remain the same at \$0.23/\$1,000 of assessed valuation. A home valued at \$200,000 would continue to pay \$46 per year (\$3.83/month). - · Addition of standardized fire and EMS equipment.
- Addition, upgrade, and maintenance of technology and service contracts to ensure cyber security and protection of health information.
- Facility maintenance and upgrades to support current and growing operational staff to support response needs.

QUESTION: Shall District levy \$1.00 per \$1,000 assessed value for five years beginning 2024-25 to bridge funding gap, support priorities? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

SUMMARY: Passage of the levy would help Bend-La Pine Schools prepare students for lifelong learning and career success. The District serves over 17,000 students.

The District is unable to fully fund student focused programs and services with revenues received under the state funding model. This proposed 5-year local option levy would allow the District to bridge the funding gap and dedicate resources for the following:

- Strengthening and adding Career Technical Education
 pathways
- Protecting and maintaining class sizes
- Recruiting and retaining teachers and support staff
- Increasing advanced academic offerings for students
- Improving support systems for struggling students
- Enhancing elective offerings in music, art, technology, business, world languages

The levy would establish a tax rate of \$1.00 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. The estimated cost for a home with a median assessed value of \$238,750 is \$239 a year.

The levy would raise an estimated:

\$21,200,000 in 2024-25 \$21,836,000 in 2025-26 \$22,491,000 in 2026-27 \$23,165,000 in 2027-28 \$23,860,000 in 2028-29

The total raised over 5 years is estimated at \$112,552,000.

Explanatory Statement

The proposed Learning Levy will pay for programs and services that are unfunded or underfunded by the state. This would enable the school district to fund unmet needs in Bend, Sunriver and La Pine.

Career Technical Education

Interest in Career Technical Education is surging, with 34 CTE programs across our seven high schools. Students can obtain the knowledge and skills they need to thrive in high-wage, high-demand careers.

The levy will open CTE to more students as we introduce new courses and modernize existing programs with updated tools and technology to meet industry standards. By aligning with the needs of our job market, we can ensure graduates are ready to succeed and contribute to our economic growth.

Optimal class sizes

When classes are the optimal size, teachers can form strong relationships with students and better provide individual attention and support. Crowded classrooms diminish learning.

Our goal is to keep average class sizes between 22 students (kindergarten) and 29 students (high school). This levy will allow the district to add educators to meet the needs of our school communities.

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Recruitment and retention

School employees should be able to live and thrive in the communities where they work. At Bend-La Pine Schools, we aspire to be an employer of choice, attracting and keeping great educators and support staff.

The levy also will improve staff support and career growth opportunities through professional learning, coaching and mentoring. Having a strong workforce is imperative in helping students succeed in the classroom and beyond.

Advanced academic offerings

Students who pursue honors and college-level courses develop skills and habits needed for success in college and careers. Stronger communication and problem-solving skills are among the benefits of accelerated learning opportunities.

The levy will enable the district to strengthen and expand its Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate and college dual credit programs. It will help remove barriers for students to access advanced courses and help teachers qualify to teach these courses.

Student support

Our ability to support students, including those facing barriers to learning, is strained under our existing funding level.

The levy will allow the District to invest in our counseling and student success staff, campus monitors, academic tutoring and the development of literacy skills. It will strengthen efforts to promote belonging and dignity among students, helping to reduce bullying and aggressive behavior.

Elective offerings

Electives such as music, art, world languages and business help students discover their passion and purpose. Taking electives inspires and challenges students through graduation.

The levy will let us address gaps in elective offerings, increase opportunities for middle school students and enhance world languages at the secondary level.

Levy rate

The proposed rate is \$1 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. A homeowner will pay an estimated \$20 a month, based on the median assessed value of residential properties in the district. Assessed value can be found below Real Market Value on the property tax statement.

Amending Redmond City Charter for qualifications to hold elective office.

QUESTION: Shall the City amend the Charter to prohibit first degree consanguinity or affinity relatives from holding elective office together?

SUMMARY: If adopted, this measure would amend Redmond City Charter, Section 12, Qualification of Officers. The amendment would add a qualification that no person would be allowed to hold elective office on the same City Council with their spouse, domestic partner, parent, or child who is a current Mayor or City Councilor. First degree relatives by consanguinity are parent/child relationships. First degree relatives by affinity are spouse/domestic partner relationships. Currently, there are no limitations on holding elective office on the same City Council with a spouse, domestic partner, parent, or child who is a current Mayor or City Councilor. QUESTION: Shall the City Charter be amended to change the term for Mayor to four years and two consecutive terms?

SUMMARY: If adopted, this measure would amend Redmond City Charter, Section 9, Mayor. The amendment would change the term for Mayor from two years to four years, beginning with the Mayor's election in 2026; and create term limits of a maximum of two consecutive four-year terms as Mayor (for a total of eight consecutive years as mayor). Following two terms, a Mayor would be eligible to run for City Councilor or to run again for Mayor after a sitting out for a four-year term. Explanatory Statement

The City of Redmond is proposing an amendment to the Redmond City Charter. For the elected office of Mayor, the amendment would change the term length from two years to four years, and establish term limits. The charter sets forth a government that is overseen by six City Councilors and one Mayor.

A charter serves as the foundational governance document of the City. It outlines the principles, structures, and processes of the City's government. Oregon law essentially allows city voters to organize their city government as the majority of voters consider best suited to meet the needs of the city. This proposed charter amendment would become operative January 1, 2026.

Currently, there are no limitations on the number of consecutive terms a person can be elected to serve as the Redmond City Mayor. If passed, a person would be eligible to be elected to two consecutive terms as Mayor. Following two terms, a person would be eligible to be elected to serve as a City Councilor or would be required to wait one term before being eligible to be elected for another term as Mayor.

Passage of this amendment would not be applicable to the upcoming mayoral term which runs from January 1, 2025, through December 31, 2026.

This Charter amendment would change the following language in Section 9 of the City Charter:

"At the biennial general election in 2024, a mayor shall be elected for a term of two years. Starting at the biennial general election in 2026, a mayor shall be elected for a term of four years. Starting at the biennial general election in 2026, the mayor shall be eligible to serve two consecutive elected terms. Following two consecutive terms, the mayor shall be ineligible to run for mayor in the following election. The ineligible mayor shall be eligible to run for councilor and shall be eligible to run for mayor in subsequent elections."

If the proposed charter amendment is not adopted, the mayoral term will continue to be two years and the City Charter would continue to have no limit on the number of consecutive terms a person can be elected to serve as mayor.

Ballot Title **7-87**BONDS TO INCREASE SAFETY; REPAIR AND UPDATE SCHOOLS

QUESTION: Shall District increase safety; repair, update schools and district facilities; leverage \$6,000,000 State grant; issue \$11,000,000 principal amount in bonds? If the Bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of Sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: Crook County School District will receive State matching funds of \$6,000,000 if bonds are approved. Bond funds are expected to finance following capital costs:

- Upgrades to heating systems including boilers and HVAC systems;
- Security improvements including secure entries, communication systems and monitoring;
- Replacement or restoration of roofing at school buildings and other district facilities;
- Capital improvements including site improvements, demolition, furnishings, equipment;
- Pay bond issuance costs.

Any remaining bond proceeds can be used to pay for any additional eligible capital projects. Bonds would mature in not to exceed 26 years from issuance and may be issued in series. The estimated increase in the tax rate is \$0.10 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. Actual levy rate may differ due to changes in interest rates and assessed value.



I support HB2004 (on the November ballot). RCV ensures fair elections and is decades overdue.

Presidential Primaries:

I support proposed initiative 2026-025 that establishes a "Lincoln Primary" and "Final Five Voting" for the U.S. Presidential election. Oregonians should have a meaningful opportunity to participate in - and affect the outcome of - the presidential race.

Oregon's closed presidential primaries will be replaced by one six-month-long tracking poll. (Lincoln Primary) Beginning February 1st and continuing through July, voters can go online and endorse a presidential candidate. At any time during the poll, voters can go back online and change their endorsements. (A tracking poll works like a caucus to consolidate support behind the best candidates.) On August 1st, the top five candidates qualify for the general election ballot.

The Electoral College:

Initiative 2026-025 also gives each Oregon Electoral College delegate the authority to vote for the winner of the nationwide popular vote. Trump lost in 2016 but was still elected. How many more elections will be stolen? The "National Popular Vote Interstate Compact" is worthless.

Free and Fair Elections:

I'm not a Democrat. I'm independent. I would run as an independent candidate, but this requires collecting 23,744 signatures. I qualified for this election as a Democrat by paying \$100. I didn't collect any signatures and wasn't required to hold an assembly of 1000 electors.

None of the Above (N.O.T.A.)

In the 2016 race for Secretary of State, a Republican was elected because a small group of progressive voters rejected a Democrat who didn't genuinely support free and fair elections. This November, I'll "write-in" N.O.T.A for each federal office on my ballot. (Upping the ante) After 32 years of asking politely, it's obvious that too many Democrats will not support equal voting rights - until forced to do so.

Who can register to vote?

To register you must be:

- \rightarrow A US Citizen
- \rightarrow A resident of Oregon
- \rightarrow At least 16 years old

If you are not yet 18 years of age, you will not receive a ballot until an election occurs on or after your 18th birthday.

How do I register to vote?

Register to vote

- → Online at <u>oregonvotes.gov/register</u>
- → By mailing your completed registration card to your county elections office.
- → By completing a registration card in person at any county elections office, the Secretary of State's Office, and some state agencies such as the DMV.

Do I need to update my registration?

Update your registration if you move, change your name, signature or mailing address, or want to change or select a political party.

You can provide the new information online at <u>oregonvotes.gov/myvote</u> or by completing and returning a voter registration card to your county elections official.

Do I need to provide I.D.?

You must provide your valid Oregon Driver's License, Permit or ID number.

If you do not have valid Oregon ID, provide the last four digits of your Social Security number.

If you do not have a valid Oregon ID or Social Security number you can find a list of acceptable alternative identification online at <u>oregonvotes.gov.</u>

What is the deadline to register?

To vote in the **May 21, 2024**, Primary Election, your completed registration card must be:

- \rightarrow postmarked by Tuesday, **April 30**; or
- → delivered to a county elections office or voter registration agency (e.g., DMV) by Tuesday, April 30.

If you register to vote online, your registration must be submitted by 11:59 pm on **April 30**.

Do I have to pick a political party?

No, you do not. If you do not select a party participating in the primary, the ballot you receive for a primary election will only include nonpartisan offices and ballot measures. All offices will appear on your general election ballot.

Address Confidentiality Program

The Address Confidentiality Program (ACP) provides participants with a legal substitute address and a mail-forwarding service. Survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking are provided with a substitute address to use on public records instead of their real address.

Individuals whose personal or family safety may be in danger if their home address is available as a public record may register to vote with confidentiality protections by applying for the Address Confidentiality Program (ACP).

To apply to the Address Confidentiality Program, you must work with a victim advocate who has been designated as an Application Assistant by the Attorney General. For more information or to find an Application Assistant near you call **888-559-9090** or visit **www.doj.state.or.us/acp**.
