BA.2 Subvariant of Omicron

What to know about BA.2, a subvariant of Omicron:



BA.2 currently represents a very small proportion of COVID-19 cases in the U.S. So far, BA.2 has caused **less than 1% of COVID-19 cases** in Oregon.

Data from Denmark and the U.K. suggest that BA.2 is **33% more transmissible** than BA.1.

Researchers are still learning about the severity of illness BA.2 causes. Preliminary research from Denmark, South Africa and the U.K. suggests that BA.2 doesn't differ from BA.1 in severity.

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The W.H.O. reports that infections caused by the BA.1. Omicron strain seem to provide **strong protection from reinfection** by BA.2.




The best protection is to get vaccinated and boosted, if eligible. It's a good idea to wear a well-fitting mask in crowded indoor spaces.



Predicted COVID Hospital Census


- These are predictions for "patient throughput" not midnight census.
- On average, 41 hospital beds occupied by COVID patients over the past 2 weeks.
- On average 20 COVID hospital beds predicted over the next 2 weeks.
- We are currently below the threshold of 25 beds for removal of the mask mandate, (10 beds per 100k) and expect to remain there for the foreseeable future.
- Two important assumptions: 1) Boosters will continue at the expected rate, 2) No new variant that evades natural or vaccinated immunity.

Positive Cases

- The large number of home tests make it difficult for direct comparisons.
 However, we have not been at this level since July 30, 2021.
- The positivity rate of 4.4% for Deschutes County and 4.5% for the tri-county region are good indicators of recovery.






Deschutes County Vaccination Status

- The rate of vaccinations has dropped considerably.
- Deschutes County is currently 2.3 percentage points above the state average for boosted individuals of all ages.
- Deschutes County is currently 3.5 percentage points above the state average for boosted individuals who are 18+ years old.

Vaccination Coverage


People of all ages living in Deschutes County





Mortality Rate and Vaccination Rate

- Deschutes County has the 6th highest vaccination rate in the state.
- Deschutes County has the 4th lowest death rate per capita in the state.
- If Jefferson and Crook Counties followed the same path for vaccinations they would have about 1/10th as many deaths, (30 versus 300).
- If Deschutes County followed the same path for vaccinations as Jefferson and Crook they would have almost 5½ times as many deaths (632 versus 117).


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

Week ending 3/5/2022


Case Counts and Rates




Vaccination by Age Group


Booster Doses by Age Group

Financial Update

COVID: ARPA Financial Update

- Approved: \$2.35 million
- **Expended**: \$1.97 million (84%)
- Average weekly February expense = \$55,000 (\$43,000 to ARPA)
- At current rate, funds will last through late April
- FEMA 100% reimbursement extended through June
